## Acknowledgements

This genealogy is a snapshot of a work in progress. It was begun in 1997, and has drawn heavily from contributions many people have made to <u>The Wheelock Family Genealogy</u> website at <u>www.WheelockGenealogy.com</u>. This website has drawn readers and contributors from all over the world, including the United States, Canada, England, Africa, and Israel. It has provided a means to disseminate information about the Wheelock Family, and to draw corrections and criticisms from many sources; and as a result has greatly facilitated the evolution and growth of the Wheelock Family tree.

Many people have contributed to the information presented here. First and foremost are the Wheelock genealogists of the past who have gathered, compiled, and published genealogies long before the advent of computers made the job easier. Probably the earliest to compile a genealogy of the Wheelock Family in the United States was Carlyle Capron Wheelock, of Woonsocket, Rhode Island¹. At the turn of the twentieth century, C. C. Wheelock scoured the primary sources of New England, and corresponded with many Wheelocks across the country. Anybody interested in Wheelock genealogy at the time probably corresponded with C. C. Wheelock. References to his work are to be found in the archives of many Wheelock family genealogists, and are occasionally found in works of local history. Carlyle C. Wheelock gathered a prodigious collection of Wheelock records, but died before they could be published. In 1955 Winifred (Thomson) Gonseth compiled the material into a manuscript. 'Wheelock Family', by Carlyle Capron Wheelock and Winifred (Thomson) Gonseth can be found in the New England Historical and Genealogical Society in Boston, at the Special Collections Library at Dartmouth College, and, no doubt, at many other genealogy libraries.

Marcus Warren Waite published a genealogy of the Wheelock Family of Calais, VT, in 1940<sup>2</sup>. This book documents the genealogy of the Wheelock family in that town, starting with the Wheelocks from Charlton, Massachusetts who founded it.

Finally, Walter Tobey Wheelock, of Uxbridge, Massachusetts compiled a genealogy of the Wheelock Family in America, centering on his ancestors who settled in Uxbridge<sup>3</sup>.

Special thanks are extended to those who contributed heavily to the early versions of this work, including Virginia (Rees) Burdick, Persis (Park) Ivett, Larry Danker, Betty (Wheelock) Sullivan, and Theresa Ann (Crowell) Bickhart who provided material and inspiration. 

Though great effort has been made to be accurate, errors no doubt exist in this work, for which I offer my apologies in advance. Source information, wherever known, is referenced by superscript, and presented in the Sources and References section at the end of the book. Whenever a source is a primary record, the highest confidence can be had in its accuracy. Many sources used are secondary records, consisting of previously published material.

# **History of the Wheelock Surname**

The Wheelock name is reported to derive from the Welsh word "chevel-og", meaning "winding river"<sup>4</sup>.

The Wheelock family origins can be traced back to the 12th century (during the reign of Henry II), in the County of Cheshire, England, where the village of Wheelock now stands. Sometime in the late 12th century

Roger Mainwaring released to Hugh de Whelok all his claim to the Manor of Whelok. Hugh de Whelok and his offspring later acquired more of the surrounding lands; and thus the village of Wheelock came into being.

In 1459 the Manor of Wheelock passed to the Leversage family (who had married into the Wheelock family)<sup>5</sup>.

The Wheelock coat of arms, shown here<sup>6</sup>, consists of a "chevron between three Catherine wheels of Sable"<sup>7</sup>. It is similar to the Leversage coat of arms: "a chevron between three ploughshares erect Sable". The crest, shown in the picture, appears not to be "officially granted", and is shown for adornment purposes only<sup>8</sup>.

In 1637, Rev. Ralph Wheelock, a highly educated graduate of Clare Hall in Cambridge, England, emigrated to Massachusetts, with his wife Rebecca, and several children<sup>9</sup>. He was a dissenting preacher, and the motivation to emigrate was no doubt a result of the religious persecution that ran high during this period of England's history.

Rev. Ralph Wheelock was a Puritan, and played an active role in establishing the townships of Dedham and Medfield, Massachusetts. He preached frequently, but never had his own ministry. His ambitions were oriented toward teaching. He was the first headmaster at the first public school in Dedham (which probably was the first public school in the colonies). He was chosen to "take up a collection for Harvard",

and thus played a role in raising funds for the first college in America<sup>10</sup>.

It is likely that most people in the United States with the last name of Wheelock are descended from Rev. Ralph. He and his offspring had many children, over the course of many generations. His progeny are many.

But not all Wheelocks in the United States descend from Ralph. There is a line of Wheelocks in South and Central America, many of whom now live in this country<sup>11</sup>. It has been shown that this line descends from somebody other than Rev. Ralph Wheelock. In addition, there is at least one family of Native Americans, Oneidas from upstate New York, now living in other parts of the country, that aquired the Wheelock surname sometime in their history. The exact circumstances of this are not yet known, but research is ongoing<sup>12</sup>.

No doubt there have been numerous Wheelock immigrants after Rev. Ralph Wheelock. There are records of an Abraham Wheelock sailing from London to Virginia in late 1673 on the ship Martha. There is another record of an Abraham Wheelock sailing from London to Virginia in 1677 on the Good Hope 13. However, Abraham appears to have been a shipmaster, and not an emigrant 14.

The Wheelocks were at the leading edge of westward settlement in colonial America. Many towns were founded by Wheelocks, including Dedham, MA, Medfield, MA, Mendon, MA, Calais, VT, Wheelock, TX, Hanover, NH, Lubbock, TX, and probably others. Eleazer Wheelock, great grandson of Rev. Ralph Wheelock, founded Dartmouth College in New Hampshire, thus perpetuating the teaching tradition so close to the heart of Ralph. Another educator, Lucy Wheelock, founder of Wheelock College in Boston, Mass. was probably also a descendant of Rev. Ralph Wheelock.

#### Descendants of Ralph Wheelock

#### Generation One

1. RALPH<sup>1</sup> WHEELOCK; b. 14 May 1600 at Dorrington, Shropshire, England; m. Rebecca Clarke, daughter of Thomas Clarke and Mary Canne, 17 May 1630 at Wramplingham, Norfolk, England; d. 11 Jan 1683/84 at Medfield, Norfolk, MA, at age 83.<sup>2</sup>

Reverend Ralph Wheelock, Puritan, educator, and founder was born in Dorrington, Shropshire, England on 14 May 1600. His family origins can be traced back to the tenth century in Wheelock Village, near Sandbach, in the County of Cheshire. Ralph was educated at Cambridge University, Clare Hall. He matriculated in 1623, obtained a Bachelor of Arts degree in 1626, and a Master of Arts in 1631.

At that time, Cambridge was the center of the dissenting religious movement that gave rise to Puritanism. His contemporaries at Cambridge University included John Milton and John Eliot, whose liberal views he seemed to share. The persecution of those with Puritan beliefs ran high during this period, which undoubtedly motivated Rev. Wheelock to participate in 'The Great Migration' which brought many new immigrants to the Massachusetts Bay Colony. By one account, 20,000 came to New England during the peak years of the migration between 1630 and 1640[1].

On 6 May 1630, in England, Rev. Wheelock was ordained priest by Francis White, Bishop of the Norfolk Diocese [12]. Shortly thereafter, on 17 May 1630, he married Rebecca Clarke. At least three children were born to the family in England (Mary Wheelock, baptised in Banham, County of Norfolk, 2 Sep 1631; Gershom Wheelock, baptised in the village of Eccles, County of Norfolk, 3 Jan 1632/33 [2]; and Rebecca Wheelock, baptised in the village of Eccles, County of Norfolk, 24 Aug 1634 [10]). There is strong evidence that Rev. Wheelock served clerical duties at the parish in Eccles, where Gershom and Rebecca were baptised. This is evidenced by his signature as 'local curate' on the register pages that record his childrens baptism[11].

Rev. Wheelock, his wife Rebecca, and at least three children sailed for the Massachusetts Bay Colony in 1637, just 7 years after Boston was first settled, and during the peak of the 'Great Migration' [3]. Some Wheelock historians have suggested that Rebecca gave birth to a daughter aboard ship, but no definitive proof is available[4].

Upon arrival, Rebecca and Ralph Wheelock settled in Watertown, Massachusetts. There Rev. Wheelock participated in a plan to create a new settlement further up the Charles River, to be called Contentment (later renamed Dedham). In 1638 Rev. Wheelock became one of the earliest settlers and a founder of Dedham. He lived there with his wife for more than a decade, and played a leading role in the affairs of the town. The records at Dedham show that children Benjamin, Samuel, Record, and Experience were born into the family of Ralph and Rebecca while at Dedham.

In July 1637, Rev. Ralph Wheelock signed the 'Dedham Covenant' which was in effect the founding constitution of the settlers of Dedham. In 1639 he and seven others were chosen for 'ye ordering of towne affayers according unto Courte Order in that behalf.' The powers that these eight men had were probably similar to the town selectment of modern times. He was also appointed to assist the surveyor ('measurer') in laying out the boundaries of the town.

On 13 Mar 1638/9, Rev. Wheelock was declared a freeman [5]. In those days, one had to be a 'freeman' in order to exercise the full right of suffrage, or to hold public office. To become a freeman, it was necessary to be a member in good standing of a local church, and to appear before the General Court to take an oath whose essential elements swore to good citizenship and good religious character.

In 1642, Ralph Wheelock was appointed the General Court clerk of writs. The General Court was the central court of the Bay Colony, with powers granted by the British Crown to decide legal matters, to dispense lands, and to establish laws. At this point in time (1643), the population of the Bay Colony was about 18,000[6].

In 1645 he was appointed one of the commissioners authorized to 'solemnize' marriages, which at the time was a civil rather than religious duty.

Although Rev. Wheelock was an ordained minister, his greater inclinations were toward teaching, which he did with great fervor and in various capacities throughout his life. Though the records are sketchy, it is likely that Rev. Wheelock was the first public school teacher in America. On 1 Feb 1644 a Dedham town meeting voted for the first free school in Massachusetts, to be supported by town taxes. Rev. Ralph Wheelock was the first teacher at this school. Three years later, in 1647, the General Court decreed that every town with 50 families or more must build a school supported by public taxes.[9].

By the late 1640's Dedham was becoming quite populous, and it was decided to establish a new township further up the Charles River, out of a tract of land that was then part of Dedham. Rev. Wheelock was appointed leader of this effort, and in 1649 he and six others were given the duties of erecting and governing a new village, to be called New Dedham, later renamed Medfield.

In May, 1651, the town of Medfield was granted the full powers of an independent town by the General Court of Massachusetts. In this year Rev. Ralph Wheelock and his family removed to Medfield, where he lived the remaining 32 years of his life. The records at Medfield show that Eleazar Wheelock was born to Ralph and Rebecca at Medfield. Eleazar's grandson would become the founder of Dartmouth College, in New Hampshire.

Though others participated in the establishment of the Town of Medfield, the Rev. Ralph Wheelock is considered to be it's primary founder. As leader of the previously mentioned committee of seven, it is almost certain [7] that Rev. Wheelock wrote the document called 'The Agreement' which, for a time, every new settler of Medfield had to sign. 'The Agreement' stated that the signatories were to abide by the town ordinances and laws, maintain orderly conduct, and resolve differences between themselves peaceably.

Rev. Ralph Wheelock was granted the first house lot in Medfield (12 acres), and served on the first Board of Selectmen (1651). He subsequently served on the Board of Selectmen in 1652-1654, and again in 1659. In 1653 he took up a collection for Harvard College, the first college in America. Fund raising for Harvard was probably a regular event, being a primary source of revenue for the fledgling institution.

In 1655, the town voted 15 pounds to be used to establish a 'schoule for the educataion of the children, to be raised by a rate according as men have taken up lands, and the rest of the maintenance to be raised upon the children that goe to schoule' [8]. Rev. Ralph Wheelock was the first schoolmaster. In his book 'Mr. Ralph Wheelock, Puritan', the Rev. Lewis Hicks speculates that Rev. Wheelock remained schoolmaster for a period of 8 years.

Every year, Medfield chose a representative to the General Court in Massachusetts. Rev. Wheelock held this position in the years 1653, 1664, 1666, and 1667.

Rebecca (Clarke) Wheelock died on 1 Jan 1680/1 in Medfield. Two years later, Rev. Wheelock died, in the 84th year of his life.

Rev. Wheelock played an active and important role in the settling of the Massachusetts Bay Colony. He was instrumental in establishing two new towns, and held virtually every office of importance in both of them. Furthermore, he was at the forefront of establishing the educational foundations of the country.

His descendents would also prove to play an important a role in settling New England and the rest of America. His son, Benjamin, was a founder of the Town of Mendon. Among his great-grandchildren were founders of several New England towns, as well as Eleazar Wheelock, the founder of Dartmouth. Succeeding generations would push farther west, settling the frontiers in New York, Michigan, Illinois, Nova Scotia, and Texas, establishing impressive credentials as teachers, writers, soldiers, founders of towns, and creators of business.

An article by Christopher Gleason Clark, in the January 1998 issue of 'The New England Historical and Genealogical Register', vol 152, entitled 'The English Ancestry of Joseph Clark (1613-1683) of Dedham and Medfield, Massachusetts' provides compelling evidence that Rev. Wheelock indeed married Rebecca Clarke.

The key components of this evidence are as follows. First, the parish registers of Wraplingham, County of Norfolk, England, contain a recording of the marriage between Ralph Wheelock, cleric, and Rebecca Clarke, 17 May 1630. Second, the will of Rebecca's father, Thomas Clark, refers to his grandaughter Marye Wheelock. Third, the baptism of Marye Wheelock, daughter of Ralph Wheelock, cleric, is recorded in the Banham, County of Norfolk parish registers. (Banham is near Wraplingham). Fourth, the will of William Clark, uncle to Elizabeth Clarke, is witnessed by Ralph Wheelocke 'in his unmistakable hand.'

Ralph Wheelock's will refers to George Barber as his 'brother-in-law'. This led to the speculation that the maiden name of Rebecca must have been Barber. But it is shown in the article that George Barber married Rebecca Clarke's sister, Elizabeth Clarke, thereby explaining the reference in Ralph Wheelock's will.

REBECCA CLARKE. For reference, conflicting genealogies can be found as follows.

Considerable discrepancy in the surname, marriage, and death dates for Rebecca can be found in the genealogical literature. The information presented in this genealogy is taken directly from an article by Christopher Gleason Clark entitled 'The English Ancestry of Joseph Clark (1613-1683) of Dedham and Medfield Massachusetts', published in the 'New England Historical and Genealogical Register', Volume 152, January 1998.

This article presents evidence firmly establishing the marriage of Rebecca Clarke to Ralph Wheelock on 17 May 1630, in Wramplingham, County of Norfolk, England. In addition, the article includes the Will of Rebecca's father, Thomas Clarke, which references his grandaughter, Marye Wheelock (probably the first child of Ralph and Rebecca). The article also establishes the marriage between Elizabeth Clarke (Rebecca's sister) and George Barber. This, coupled with the fact that Ralph Wheelock refers to George Barber as his 'brother-in-law' in his will, provides strong evidence that Ralph indeed married Rebecca Clarke, not Rebecca Barber, or Rebecca Wilkerson as has been reported elsewhere.

'Gersham Wheelocke filius Radolphi Wheelocke baptisatus fuit 3 die Jan:1632/33.'

'Gershom was in the list for Mr. Wilson's rate in 1657 [1], and probably came of age about that time. He married Hannah Stodder, daughter of John of Hingham, in 1658. In 1663, he had liberty from the town to cut '200 sedar plank' in the common swamp. His house stood on the Harbor Island road, a short distance south-west of the present residence of Charles Hamant. He rung the bell and swept the meeting-house in 1674, for which the town paid him 2 pounds, 15 shillings. The next year, he assisted in thatching the meeting-house. His house was burned by the Indians in 1676, and it appears to have been rebuilt on the same spot [2]. He died in 1684, and in 1690 his heirs sold the homestead to Joseph Plimpton.'

Note [1]: Mr Wilson was the first minister in Medfield.

Note [2]: King Philips War.

HANNAH STODDER. Hannah was the daughter of John and Hannah Stodder.

She was born circa 1638 at England.

According to 'The Story of Colonial Lancaster', by Marion Fuller Safford, 1937, The Tuttle Publishing Company, Rutland, Vt. Timothy Wheelock (from Lancaster, MA) participated in an 'unsuccessful, even disastrous expedition against Canada', in or around 1688. Conducted by the Royal Governor of the Commonwealth, Governor Phips, this expedition resulted from the ongoing conflict between Britain and France. Timothy Wheelock, and the four other Lancaster soldiers who participated in this conflict were not properly paid until '50 years later' when land grants were made to their heirs.

William S. Tilden, in 'The History of Medfield' writes that Timothy seems to have been incapable of taking care of himself. In 1699, a special town meeting was called (in Medfield) to see what to do about Timothy Wheelock. Voted 'to pay out of the town treasury to John Arnold, prison keeper, to take the best and most prudent care of Wheelock'. In 1749, Joseph Wheelock of Lancaster deeds lands to Ephraim Wheelock of Medfield 'for taking care of my brother Timothy Wheelock.' He died in Medway.

Benjamin Wheelock, b. 8 Jan 1639/40 in Dedham, Massachusetts, was probably the first Wheelock born in the American colonies. The Dedham Vital Records record the birth date of Benjamin as follows: "Benjamin born 8 of the 1[0] Month of 1639". His baptism date is given as follows: "ye 12 of ye 11th month 1639".

He lived for about ten years in Dedham, where his father, Rev. Ralph Wheelock, was an active leader in town affairs. He moved with his family to Medfield, MA in 1651, the year of its founding and first settlement. He married Elizabeth Bullen in 1668. The Medfield Town records indicates that he owned a house in that same year. [1]

In 1669 he received a small grant of land in Medfield "between his house and the brook, taking in some part of the brook". [2] In 1675 he is listed in the Medfield town records as a proprietor, along with his brother Gershom, and his father, Ralph. [3]

Sometime around 1688 he removed with his family to Mendon. [8] The first notice of him in the Mendon records is in 1688 when he aquired land from Mathias Puffer: "Mathias Puffers forty Acre Lott Now Benjemin whelocks with all the Rights and Priuelidges there unto belonging or any wayes Appertaining: As appears by A Deed of Sale baring Date Aprill 25: 1688". [4] A year later, he appears on a list of those paying taxes to "defray Mr. Rawson's [minister] Salary." Benjamin Wheelock's name appears as a proprietor on a historical plaque in the center of Mendon, though his name does not appear on the original list of proprietors in 1660. In 1693 Benjamin served the town as a "Tything Man", along with two others. According to the Annals of Mendon "tithing men were to present all the idle and disorderly persons, profane swearers or cursors, Sabbath-breakers and disorderly persons, that they may be duly punished and discouraged." In 1696 he served as a Constable, in 1700 as a selectman, and in 1701 on a special committee to "give the selectmen instructions".

In 1706, or thereabouts, Benjamin Wheelock acquired posession of the "ancient" Benjamin Alby corn mill, which he purchased from Mathias Puffer. In 1713 he deeded mill priveledges to his sons Obadiah and Benjamin, Jr. Later, in 1719, all three deeded the mill to Josiah Wood. [6] Benjamin is reported to have lived on the "Old Rehoboth Road, near where Andrus Wheelock lived and died". [6,7] According to the proprietors records, "The House Lott being foty Acres Laid out upon the East side of the Road Leading to Rehoboth Nere the Round Medow: and bounded as followeth Weasterly on the Aboue sd Road Northerly upon the Land of Samuel Thayer Easterly Partly upon the Mill Riuer: and Partly on Medow and southerly upon Comon Land -- Laid out by Joseph White --" [4]

There is some uncertainty about the second wife of Benjamin. The Mendon Vital Records indicate that his first wife, Elizebeth, died in 1689, yet show two additional children born to "Benjamen and Elizebeth" in 1693 and 1695. There is no marriage record for Benjamin indicating a second marriage. Walter T. Wheelock, in "The Wheelock Family in America, 1637-1969" asserts that Elizabeth French, widow of Jonathan Thayer, was "probably" his second wife, but cites no sources.

Charles Pope, in his book "The Pioneers of Massachusetts" indicates that "John French [father of Elizabeth French] died 1692, age 80 years. Division of estate was made to Dependence, Thomas, Samuel, to Temperance, wife of John Bowditch, to Elizabeth Wheelock of Mendon, and the child of Mary Lamb, deceased." The Elizabeth referenced here was probably his daughter, Elizabeth French. By process of elimination, it seems likely that Elizabeth French must have married Benjamin Wheelock.

No record of death is found for Benjamin, nor has any record been found for the settlement of his estate.

Her baptism record reads as follows: 'Elizabeth of Samuell Bullin and Mary his wife was baptised 14d 12m 1646.'

'Rebeckah Wheelocke filia Radolphus Wheelocke & Rebeckah Uxoris eius baptisatus Vicesimo quarto [24th] Aug: 1634.'

The Roxbury Vital Records indicate that Rebecca died in childbirth. However, no child is shown being born to John Crafts and Rebecca in 1667. The date of death is given as 28 Nov 1667; the date of burial 24 Nov 1667. Obviously, these records must be in error.

JOHN CRAFTS. John Crafts was the son of Griffin and Alice Crafts of Roxbury, MA. (Source: 'The Crafts Family: A Genealogical and Biographical History...', J. M Crafts and W. F. Crafts, 1893. It has been suggested that he is the earliest born child in the Roxbury town records. (Source: 'Genealogical Dictionary of the First Settlers of New England', John Savage, 1860).

He was born on 10 Jul 1630 at Roxbury, Suffolk, MA.<sup>12</sup> He married Mary **Hudson** on 30 Mar 1669 at Roxbury, Suffolk, MA.<sup>12</sup> He died on 3 Oct 1685 at Roxbury, Suffolk, MA, at age 55.<sup>12</sup>

'The first notice of him in the town records is in 1676, when he killed four wolves. He removed to Mendon soon after his [first] marriage. He was a surveyor of land there in 1681. He distinguished himself as a hunter of wild beasts while living in Mendon. Afterward, returning to Medfield about 1701, he purchased of Grindal Rawson the Wilson homestead, where the town hall now stands. He also became owner of the original Wheelock estate on the west corner of North Street. Captain Wheelock was selectman in 1720, and was a prominent man in town affairs. He died in 1731.' (Pg. 508).

'In 1705, Isaac Chenery, Sen., of Dedham [father of Mary], deeded lands to his son-in-law, Eleazar Wheelock.' (Pg. 339).

Mr. Tilden writes of Rev. John Wilson's widow, shortly after his death.

'[Mrs. Wilson] was living in Mendon in 1702, probably with her youngest daughter, the estate here [Medfield] having been sold in 1701 to Eleazar Wheelock, who transformed it into an inn.'

Adin Ballou ('History of the Town of Milford, Worcester County, From Its First Settlement to 1881', 1882) writes as follows.

'Two of his [Rev. Ralph Wheelock's] sons settled in Mendon, perhaps before their father's death; for they paid parochial taxes there in in 1685 or 1686. Their names were Benjamin and Eliazer, or Eleazer. Eliazer settled in the vicinity of 'Goat Hill' and 'Wolf Hill,' in the now northerly part of Uxbridge, on the 'Great River'. He was a very daring man, and became famous as a hunter and exterminator of ferocious wild beasts, then fearfully abundant.'

Eleazar apparently passed his enthusiasm for firearms on to his grandchildren. Moses Wheelock and Ephraim Wheelock were both high ranking officers (Colonels) in the Revolutionary War.

ELIZABETH FULLER was born between 1655 and 1658 at Rehoboth, MA. She died on 11 Jan 1688/89 at Mendon, Worcester,  $MA.^9$

Some published genealogies do not list Lydia as a daughter of Samuel Wheelock and Lydia Rice (for example, see 'The Wheelock Family in America, 1637-1969', by Walter T. Wheelock.).

Her birth is not listed in the Sudbury or Marlborough Vital Records, as is the rest of the children born to Samuel and Lydia. However, her marriage to Richard Ward is listed in the Sudbury Vital Records.

There are two clues that she is the daughter of Samuel Wheelock and Lydia Rice. The first is her name, Lydia. The second is the fact that she is married on the same day as her presumed brother, Gershom Wheelock, in the same town, Sudbury. Furthermore, the Sudbury Vital Records refer to both of them as being 'of or Near Joyning to worscester' (Shrewsbury), rendering it plausible that they were siblings.

The Ward Genealogy states that after the death of Richard Ward, Lydia Wheelock 'as supposed' married Aaron Hardy of Southborough, 4 May 1768.

'The Early Records of Lancaster, MA, 1643-1725', editted by Henry S. Nourse, Lancaster, 1884, makes numerous references to Joseph Wheelock.

During Queen Anne's War (1701-1713), Joseph Wheelock signed a petition along with 20 others, dated 1703, to His Excellency, Joseph Dudley, Esq., regarding, 'Inasmuch as the inhabitants of the Town of Lancaster were driven out by the Enemy and the place wholly deserted, their mainten- ance of the Minister is now null and void'.[pg 141].

A document, dated April 1704 lists all the garrisons of Lancaster. Joseph Wheelock is listed 'on ye West Side Penicook River Called ye Neck - Serg't Josiah White, a Garrison Himselfe Comander - Joseph Wheelock, John Glazier, George Glazier, Joseph Glazier'. [Pg. 143].

The Lancaster Vital Records record the date on which Joseph and his wife Elizabeth became members of the Church of Christ in Lancaster, under John Prentice, Pastor, 2 Feb 1728/29.

The Medfield Vital Records record the name as 'Marie Wheelocke.'

Mary's marriage to Nathaniel Ware is clearly indicated in the Wrentham Vital Records, but the subsequent marriages to Cornelius Fisher and Thomas Bacon (shown in the LDS Ancestral File) are not so directly evident.

Nathaniel Ware, Sr. died in 1724. In 1726/27 'Mary Ware' married Cornelius Fisher, according to the Wrentham VRs. This marriage is also (presumably) documented in 'The Fisher Genealogy: Record of the Descendants of Joshua, Anthony, and Cornelius Fisher, of Dedham, Mass., 1636-1640,' by Philip A. Fisher. The Wrentham VRs report no children born to Mary and Cornelius.

Cornelius Fisher died in 1743 in his 84th year. In 1746, 'Mary Fisher' married Thomas Bacon. The Wrentham Vital Records report no children born to Thomas and Mary. In 1750, Mary Bacon, w. Thomas, died in her 76th year.

NATHANIEL WARE. Nathaniel Ware is the son of Robert Ware and Margaret Hunting.

He was born on 7 Oct 1648 at Dedham, Suffolk, MA. He died on 10 Jul 1724 at Wrentham, Norfolk, MA, at age 75.25 Children of Mary<sup>3</sup> Wheelock and Nathaniel Ware all b. at Wrentham, Norfolk, MA, were as follows:

CORNELIUS FISHER. Cornelius Fisher was the son of Cornelius Fisher and Leah Heaton.

He was born on 8 Feb 1660 at Dedham, Suffolk, MA.<sup>28</sup> He died on 6 Jan 1743 at Wrentham, Norfolk, MA, at age 82.<sup>25</sup> There were no children of Mary<sup>3</sup> Wheelock and Cornelius Fisher.

THOMAS **B**ACON was born circa 1674. He died on 10 Apr 1749 at Wrentham, Norfolk, MA.<sup>25</sup> There were no children of Mary<sup>3</sup> **Wheelock** and Thomas **Bacon**.

The Medfield Vital Records record the name as 'Abiell Wheelocke.'

Some have speculated that Abiel Wheelock married Benjamin Albee of Mendon, MA. If this is the case, then a different Abiel Wheelock must have married Joseph Ward, one whose birth is not accounted for in the Vital Records of Massachusets.

The case for the Abiel Wheelock/Benjamin Albee marriage is built on the following indirect evidence.

- (1) The dates are consistent. Many children are born to Benjamin Albee and Abiel \_\_\_\_ in Mendo.
- (2) It is known from deeds and the proprietors records of Mendon that Benjamin Albee lived ne.
- (3) Benjamin Albee and his wife Abiel had a child named Obadiah, a name that does not appear.
- (4) A great-grandhild of Benjamin and Abiel is named Obadiah Wheelock Albee.

However, it also seems plausible that Abiel, daughter of Benjamin Wheelock and Elizabeth Bullen, married Joseph Ward of Marlborough. There are a number of Wheelocks who went to Marlborough, and married into the Ward family. First and foremost was Abiel's aunt, Record Wheelock, who married Increase Ward. Abiel's cousin, Samuel Wheelock, lived in Marlborough for a time, before moving to Shrewsbury; and it is likely that the Lydia Wheelock who married Richard Ward in Sudbury was his daughter.

Benjamin Wheelock was a Miller, Farmer. Benjamin Wheelock, third generation Wheelock in the Massachusetts Bay Colony, was born in Medfield, Massachusetts, 12 Dec 1678; the first male child of Benjamin Wheelock, Sr. and Elizabeth (Bullen) Wheelock. His grandparents, Rev. Ralph Wheelock, Rebecca (Clarke) Wheelock, Samuel Bullen, and Mary (Morse) Bullen were all early settlers of both Dedham and Medfield.[1].

Benjamin, Sr. was a proprieter of the town of Mendon, and moved there with his family circa 1685, thus becoming one of the founding settlers of the town. Benjamin, Jr. was but six or seven years old at the time. Benjamin, Sr. was a large landholder in Mendon, and was the third owner of the Albee Cornmill. In 1713, when Benjamin, Jr. was 25 years of age, his father deeded mill priveledges to he and his brother, Obadiah. [2] Thus Benjamin became established as a miller and a farmer in Mendon, where he lived out the rest of his life.

Benjamin married twice; first to Hulda Thayer, whose grandfather, Ferdinando Thayer was the principle founder of Mendon [3], and second to Rebecca Kinney. Having married Rebecca fairly late in life, all of Benjamin's children were born to his first wife, Hulda.

In 1721, Benjamin aquired a parcell of land in Oxford, Mass, which he passed to his son's Jonathan, David, and Paul circa 1735. This land later was annexed to Charlton (in 1757), where the three brothers played principle roles as early settlers and leaders of town affairs.[4].

On 13 Sep 1746 Benjamin died in Mendon, leaving his wife, Rebecca, and eight children. His will is on file with the Worcester Probate Office, case number 63618. In it, he leaves bequests to his wife Rebecca (to sustain her for the rest of her life, or until she remarries); land to his sons Benjamin, Daniel, Silas, and Peter; money to his sons Jonathan, David, and Paul; money and miscellaneous domestic items to his grandchildren Peter Thayer, Mary Thayer, and Abigail Thayer (the children of his deceased daughter Mary Wheelock); money to his daughter Hulda (Wheelock) (Sanford) Rice; money and other items to his grandchildren Seth and Mary Sanford (children of Hulda).

#### Addendum.

M. W. Waite, in his book 'The Wheelock Family of Calais', indicates that Hulda Thayer was the daughter of Jonathan Thayer, and Elizabeth (French) Thayer, and that Jonathan Thayer was the son of Ferdinando Thayer, the principle founder of Mendon. Is it possible that Elizabeth (French) Thayer is the same Elizabeth French as that who married Benjamin, Senior?

HULDAH THAYER. Huldah Thayer is the daughter of Jonathan Thayer and Elizabeth French of Mendon. She is the granddaughter of Ferdinando Thayer, one of the founders of Mendon.

She was born on 11 May 1682 at Mendon, Worcester, MA. She died on 7 Jul 1739 at age 57.31

Ruth was the daughter of Christopher Huntington, Jr. and Sarah (Adgate) Huntington.

William S. Tilden, in 'History of Medfield', writes as follows.

'[Ephraim] owned the ancestral corner as well as the Wilson place. He was chosen deacon of the church in 1738, and was a prominent man in town affairs.'

'The old field that was Mr. Wilson's, lying between South and Pleasant Streets, had the first piece taken out of it in 1739, when Deacon Wheelock sold five rods on the corner of Main and South Streets to Richard Mann to build a sadler's shop upon.'

MIRIAM BULLEN. Miriam was 24 years old at the time of her death. (Source: Headstone record, taken by Roderick B. Sullivan, Jr.).

One of the first names that appears to us on the records is that of Gershom Wheelock, who for his enterprise and cheerful disposition, deserves especial mention. He is said to have been the first man to build a house in the new settlement and spent one winter in its erection. This house was situated on what is now the old road to Worcester in the valley near 'Middlebrook.' He labored alone that winter, keeping up his spirits through the cold, dreary days by his merry whistling, sleeping in the loft and pulling the ladder up after him at night, always whistling his morning song before putting it down again. His courage never failed until the spring birds sang to him while he whistled, and the house was done; then he married Abigail Flagg of Marlboro, and housekeeping began in Shrewsbury. In 1720 his father Samuel Wheelock, who owned the land, gave him a deed of eighty acres and the house, 'In consideration of Love, Good will and affection which I have and do have towards my dutiful Son Gershom Wheelock!' The first house built in town was the first to be burned; nothing was saved from the fire but a few pieces of furniture. Being dissatisfied with his ventures in that part of the town, he next built a house on the Boylston road, the one which is now occupied by his great-grandson Erastus Wheelock.

Gershom appears to have been quite an important man in the new town, holding at different times several town offices. He was ensign in the first military company here and afterwards commissioned Captain. The Wheelock house as shown in the engraving is a low, ancient house, shingled on the outside, with narrow windows and quaint, low rooms. It has not been added to, but remains much the same as when built more than a century and a half ago.[Note by Rick Sullivan: This was written in 1892. One hundred years later the same still holds true.].

In reference to Captain Gershom Wheelock.

He is said to have been the first of the family, who settled here [Shrewsbury], if not the first settler in this town. He erected a house between where the houses now are of Joseph Nurse and the late Daniel Maynard, and on the same side of the road. There he made improvements and spent one winter alone. He is said to have been of a cheerful disposition, and, that while here solitary and alone, he slept aloft in his log house, drawing the ladder up after him at night, and whistling a tune in the morning before leaving his bed.

His father with his family moved there, from Marlboro, the next spring, and being owner of the land, he was accounted the first settler. Having been burnt out there, they removed to house lot No. 26, of which he received soon after a deed of gift from his father, bearing date in 1720.

He was one of the four first appointed sergeants in the military company when he first organized in this town. He was afterward Ensign, Lieutenant, and in 1742, commissioned a Captain in the Regiment commanded by Col Nahum Ward.

Also, from Ward, 'History of Shrewsbury, 1717 to 1829', it is stated that Gershom was on the board of selectmen in the years 1731 and 1736. His father, Samuel Wheelock, was on the board of selectmen in the years 1727, 1730, and 1732.

ABIGAIL FLAGG. According to the Shrewsbury Vital Records, Abigail, wife of 'Captain Gershom', died in her 69th year.

Joseph Wheelock was a 'chainman' in several surveys of land conducted in Ashburnham, MA, prior to its incorporation. The 'History of Ashburnham' shows him in the list of original proprietors as follows.

The administration of Jonathan's estate, Worcester County Probate Office, Case 63714, mentions his wife, Elizabeth Wheelock, Mary Wheelock (youngest daughter), Joanna (second daughter), Jonathan Wheelock, (eldest son), Elizabeth (eldest daughter of the deceased, wife of Joseph Whitcomb), James Wheelock (second/fourth?? son), Luke Wheelock (a third son of the deceased).

The tabulation of inventory for Jonathan's estate was commenced 3 May 1754. Presumably, this was shortly after he died.

The final division of estate was made April 4, 1759. It mentions the heirs shown above. One of the signatories is John Wheelock, guardian. This is probably the brother of Jonathan Wheelock. Guardianships for James, Joanna, Mary, and Luke were drawn up in 1759; they were presumably placed in care of their Uncle, John Wheelock.

'Wheelock Genealogy', by Carlyle Wheelock and Winifred Gonseth, 1955, shows two Joanna Wheelocks born to Jonathan and Elizabeth, the second, born later, marries Deacon Ephraim Carter. The evidence for this is not cited.

But record 103508 in 'Daughters of the American Revolution', (Volume 104, pg 154) by Mrs. Genevieve Carter Reybold, proves that she descends from Deacon Ephraim Carter, who fought in the Revolutionary War, and cites the birth and death dates of his wife, Joanna Wheelock, as 1749 - 1803. Since a birth date of 1749 is later than the birth date recorded in the Vital Records, it is possible that the first Joanna Wheelock, born 1740, died, and a second Joanna Wheelock, born 1749, lived and married Ephraim Carter. Of course, it is also possible that the 1749 date is an incorrect transcription of 1740.

Peter, Mary, and Abigail are mentioned in their grandfather Benjamin Wheelock's will. Benjamin Wheelock's will, dated 1745, refers to his daughter Mary Thayer as 'deceased'. Walter T. Wheelock, in 'The Wheelock Family in America, 1637 to 1969' lists Elizabeth Thayer as a daughter of Mary Wheelock and Ebenezer Thayer, but no mention is found in the Vital Records of Mendon or surrounding towns.

EBENEZER **THAYER.** Ebenezer Thayer resided in Bellingham at the time of his marriage to Mary Wheelock. The Mendon Vital Records records his birth as follows: Ebenezer, T.C., s. of Isaac and Marcy, Sep. 6, 1696 (Sep 6, 1697 dup). So his birth may have been in 1696 or 1697. (Source: Mendon, MA Vital Records).

Benjamin is referred to as 'Lieutenant' in his marriage record to Joanna Taft.

The LDS Ancestral Fileshows a marriage between Mary Thayer and Benjamin Wheelock, 23 May 1720. Mary, it states, was born 22 Dec 1704, the daughter of Isaac and Marcy Thayer.

The Mendon Vital Records shows no such marriage; but does record a marriage between Mary Thayer and Benjamin White, 23 May 1720. It is not likely that this marriage record is in error, since Mary Thayer and Benjamin White have children Benjamin, Joseph, and Mercy between 1722/23 and 1728. Benjamin White's birth record is also recorded in Mendon, 28 May 1701, son of Joseph and Lidea. The fact that Benjamin White named his son after his father lends further evidence that Benjamin White is not Benjamin Wheelock.

'Wheelock Genealogy', by Carlyle Wheelock and Winifred Gonseth, 1955, says the following about Benjamin Wheelock's will.

'The will of Benjamin Wheelock, Gentlemen, is dated Mendon, MA, Mar. 23, in the 16th year of the reign of King George III, 1776, and leaves son Jesse the homestead; mentions dau. Huldah Penniman; Children of Benjamin, deceased: Benjamin, Joseph, Amariah, Marvel, Sarah Kent, Hannah, Louise, Luletta, Unice; Children of son Jonathan: Eleazar, Lyman, Alpheus, Willard, Dolle, Deborah.'

DEBORAH TAFT was born on 14 Nov 1702 at Mendon, Worcester, MA.9

JOANNA TAFT. Joanna's memorial stone bears the inscription: In memory of Mrs. Joanna, wife of Mr. Benjamen Wheelock, died 25 Apr 1776, age 61 yrs. Joanna's death record in the Mendon VRs refers to her husband as 'Lieut. Benjamin.'

She was buried at Old Cemetery, Mendon, MA.<sup>15</sup> She was born circa 1715. She died on 25 Apr 1776 at Mendon, Worcester, MA.<sup>6</sup> There were no children of Benjamin<sup>4</sup> Wheelock and Joanna Taft.

The will of Daniel Wheelock, Sr., on file at the Glocester, RI, town clerks office, is summarized by Carlyle Capron Wheelock, coauthor of 'Wheelock Genealogy', with Winifred (Thomson) Gonseth, as follows.

'The will of Daniel Wheelock of Glocester, RI, dated July 13, 1789, and probated Sep. 2, 1793, states that he is an old man; leaves wife Deborah all profits of homestead farm except half the profits of orchard; son Paul of Uxbridge lands and half the profits of orchard; if he leaves a yoke of oxen they are for son Paul and his grandson Phyletus; grandson Phineas Keith his greatcoat; mentions grandson Esek; leaves grandsons Seth, Calvin, and Luther, the homestead farm; mentions daughters Mary and Deborah.'

In 1735, Jonathan Wheelock bought 150 acres of land in the 'Country Gore', a 10,000 acre tract of land adjoining Oxford, but not part of Oxford. Jonathan Wheelock and Jonathan Tucker appear to have been the first settlers in the Gore. In 1750 Jonathan and his brother David Wheelock signed a petition (with many others) to become part of Charlton. Finally, in 1757, the Gore was annexed to Charlton.

In 1758, the first meeting after the Gore was annexed was held to elect district officers. Jonathan Wheelock was chosen Treasurer.

In the years 1759 and 1762, Jonathan Wheelock was on the Board of Selectman.

Jonathan Wheelock ran a tavern in the Country Gore (now Charlton) for many years. He aquired it from John Thompson in 1751. (Source: History of Oxford).

He apparently owned a tannery in the Northside, which he sold to Ebenezer Davis (brother of Jacob Davis) in 1770.

Some genealogies make reference to a 'great sickness' that struck many residents of Charlton during 1759. The family of Jonathan Wheelock appears to have been particularly hard struck by this. Rhoda, Joseph, Mercy, Amos, and Jonathan all died within a few days of each other in July, 1759. The 'great sickness' was probably a combination of measles and dysentery.

According to Charles Hultgren, a member of the Charlton Historical Society (1997), and an expert on the region of Charlton known as the Northside (where most of the Charlton Wheelock's lived), Jonathan Wheelock's original house still stands. It is located on the Northside Turnpike, two houses to the east of the Ryder House, on the northern side of the road. (The Ryder House is clearly marked as a historical landmark, and was partially built by Jonathan's son, Eli.).

Paul Wheelock, farmer, businessman, and one of the principle early settlers of Charlton, Massachusetts, was born in Mendon, Massachusetts, 13 Jan 1715/16 to Benjamin Wheelock and Elizabeth Bullen.

When Paul and his brothers Jonathan and David came of age, circa 1735, their father passed a tract of land to them in Oxford, Mass. in what was then known as the Gore Lands. Paul and his brothers moved from Mendon to Oxford at that time, and established farms on these lands.

At about this time, Paul married Abigail Chapin. The record of this marriage does not survive in the Vital Records, but it probably occurred after Paul settled the land he aquired from his father. Abigail was half cousin to President John Adams, the second president of the United States. Their child, Adams, was no doubt named for this side of the family. Paul remained married to Abigail for the rest of his life, fathering at least 10 children.

On 12 June 1750, Jonathan, David, and others signed a petition to separate from Oxford and form Charlton. In 1757, the Gore Lands became part of what is now known as the Northside of Charlton.

Paul was a leader in the affairs of Charlton. He served on the Board of Selectment in the years 1760, 1766, and 1772 [1]; and was a Captain in the local Militia[2].

He built a house in Charlton on Cemetery Rd., opposite Whee Laddie Pond, and established one of the largest apple farms in New England at that time [3]. By one account, he was one of the wealthiest men in Charlton[6].

As of 1998 his house was still standing. Though several additions have been made to the structure, the original framing remains intact[4].

On 17 May 1776, being 'sick and weak of body', Paul recorded his last will and testament. The exact date and cause of death is not known, but the will was probated on 4 Mar 1777 [5]. His wife, Abigail, and ten children were accounted for in the will (Ruth, Silas, Sarah, Mary, Abigail, Seth, Edward, Paul, John, and Adams).

His wife, Abigail, outlived him by 23 or 24 years. She died in 1800. Headstones have never been located for either of them.

ERRATA.

Marcus Waite (and other published genealogies) report that the birth place of all of Paul's Children is uncertain, but was probably Charlton.

Based on Paul's will, it seems likely that Paul Wheelock, Jr. was born well before Silas Wheelock. Paul, Jr. was of age at his father's death, whereas Silas Wheelock was not.

ABIGAIL CHAPIN. Abigail Chapin is half sister to Rachel Chapin the wife of Paul's brother, David Wheelock. She was also half cousin to the second president of the United States, John Adams. She and John had the same grandfather, Joseph Adams, Jr. Abigail lived long enough to see her cousin reach the presidency in 1797.

She was born on 27 May 1721 at Mendon, Worcester, MA. She died on 11 May 1800 at Charlton, Worcester, MA, at age 78. Children of Paul Wheelock and Abigail Chapin were as follows:

Silas attained the rank of Captain in the local militia.

Later, he attained the rank of Colonel, and command the 7th Worcester County Regiment, which marched to Cambridge and Roxbury in response to the Lexington Alarm of 19 April 1775.

Colonel Silas Wheelock was one of the highest ranking members of the Wheelock family to serve in the Revolutionary War.

Many of his children also served, including Simeon, Caleb, Calvin, and Luther.

Silas and Hannah singed the Articles of Faith of the Baptist Church in Bellingham in 1750. (Source: 'The Wheelock Family in America, 1637-1969', by Walter T. Wheelock.).

David Wheelock, born in Mendon, lived in a portion of Oxford, MA, called the Country Gore. His brothers Jonathan and Paul also lived in the Gore. Unsatisfied with their representation in Oxford town affairs, residents of the Country Gore signed a petition to separate from Oxford, and become part of Charlton. David and his brother Jonathan both signed this petition on 12 June 1750. Finally, in 1757 the Gore was annexed to Charlton; becoming the northern section of the town.

David was active in the affairs of Charlton, holding office as a selectman in the years 1761, 1771, 1775, and 1777. (The first Board of Selectmen was formed in 1755.).

In 1779, a committee consisting of David Wheelock, Isaiah Blood, and Stephen Fay was chosen to provide for the families of Revolutionary War Soldiers of Charlton. In September of that year, the town voted to raise 900 pounds for this purpose.

In 1781 Jacob Davis, an active participant in Charlton town affairs, and a Colonel in the Revolutionary War, organized several residents of Charlton to purchase a tract of land in Vermont, later to become the town of Calais. David was one of the 60 original proprieters of Calais, as were his nephews Peter and Eli Wheelock.

David passed his interest in Calais to his son, Abijah, who became the first permanent settler of Calais in 1789. Abijah purchased lot 51 of the first division from Col. Davis for 20 pounds lawful English money.

David's first wife, Lydia White, died in the 'great sickess' of 1759. His children Jemima and Hendrick also died in 1759, at an early age, probably suffering the same fate.

He married 2nd Rachel Chapin, half sister to Abigail Chapin, Paul Wheelock's wife.

At the close of the French and Indian war, the British government embarked on a program to replace the French speaking, Roman Catholic influence in Nova Scotia (and the other Canadian territories) with Protestant and English speaking influence. To encourage this, the British governors of Nova Scotia offered grants of free land to settlers. In the 1760's, a wave of New Englanders (called 'Planters') migrated to Nova Scotia.

The Rev. Eleazar Wheelock, Congregational minister, orator, educator, and founder of Dartmout Eleazar entered Yale College. His college education was funded with the proceeds of a legacy Benjamin Pomeroy, the first award of the Dean Berkeley Donation for the distinction in classi.

For a year following his graduation he continued his theological studies at Yale. In May 1734 served as minister for 35 years. Two months later (29 Apr 1735) he married Sarah Davenport, w.

At the time of Rev. Eleazar Wheelock's graduation, a religious revival known as the Great Awa popular preacher, George Whitefield, toured the seaboard of the Connecticut River Valley, pre entitled 'Sinners in the hands of an Angry God.' [2] Although the Great Awakening drew increa.

Rev. Eleazar Wheelock participated fully and enthusiastically in the Great Awakening. He was hundred more sermons than there are days in the year' to promote the revival. [1,3] He was cr State of Religion in New England, 1743' criticized Rev. Wheelock (among others) for his over.

As a supporter of the Saybrook Platform [5], Rev. Wheelock was not a proponent of Separatism. In 1743, the Connecticut Assembly, in an attempt to regulate revivalist activity, passed 'An could not collect a salary. As a result of this, Rev. Wheelock lost his salary. [6] Though he owned a great deal of farml Toward this end, he began to take students into his home, and in 1743, he took in Samson Occo ministry. Occom went on to become a popular Presbyterian minister, preaching both to Native A.

Rev. Wheelock's success with Samson Occom encouraged him to pursue a school for Native Americ missionaries. The girls were to be taught 'housewifery' and writing. The school was to be sup.

Toward this end, in 1754, Rev. Wheelock accepted two Delaware Natives from New Jersey. The pr New England tribes, and from the Six Nations were gathered, and by the year 1762, Wheelock ha.

Rev. Eleazar Wheelock spent considerable time raising funds to support the school, in which e 1761 and 1767. In 1765, he sent Samson Occom and Nathaniel Whitaker (a Presbyterian Minister) English board of trustees, headed by William Legge, Earl of Dartmouth. Things had not progressed so well on the missionary and recruiting front. Many of the Native work. Sir William Johnson [8], an agent of Native American affairs, and trusted advocate, per Charity School, and his Native Americans with it. After this, Rev. Wheelock could no longer e.

In addition to this, he was having some trouble with his parishioners in Lebanon, stemming in.

These events, coupled with his desire to enlarge his school to include a college (for the edu of Trustees headed by Lord Dartmouth were against adding a college to the school, but Rev. Wh dated 13 December 1769, named Eleazar Wheelock founder and first president of the college, an after whom the college was named was against it's establishment.

Several offers of land were obtained for the location of the college. Dresden, NH (later rena the region, and it's proximity to Canada, where Wheelock hoped to recruit Indian students for Rev. Wheelock obtained a dismissal from his church in Lebanon (where he served 35 years), and house the college. The living conditions were severe, and considerable fortitude was required.

In 1771, four students were graduated in the first commencement of Dartmouth. Among these fou became the second president of Dartmouth.

The funds collected in England ran out in 1774, and the institution of Dartmouth was blighted the English, leaving few recruits for the school. Of notable exception was the Oneida Nation.

The war left Dartmouth in considerable debt. Many decades would pass before the college again substantial support for the college came from this grant of land.

Rev. Wheelock suffered ill health during his later years. He was afflicted with asthma, and ' and excelled in his many administrative duties, which included supervising farming operations Charity School (without salary), and of Dartmouth College.

Rev. Eleazar Wheelock died during the Revolutionary War, on 24 April 1779. He is buried in Ha with continuations.

Rev. Wheelock's descendents include John Wheelock, Lieutenant Colonel in the Continental Army Wheelock Ripley, a General in the War of 1812, and namesake of the town of Ripley, Louisiana.

SARAH DAVENPORT. At the time of her marriage to Dr. Wheelock, Sarah Davenport was the widow of Captain William Maltby, of New Haven, CT.

Sarah's tombstone inscription reads.

### REV. BENJAMIN POMEROY.

Rev. Benjamin **Pomeroy** was a Minister. 'Here lies the body of Rev. Benj. Pomeroy, D.D. minister of the First Church of Hebron, and a trustee of Dartmouth College. Native of Suffield. Ob. Dec. 21st. 1784; aged 81. For 50 years a zealous preacher of the gospel, and eminently successful [...]. A Patron of learning, a firm and active Pastor and a friend to the distressed.'

Benjamin Pomeroy was a contemporary of the Rev. Eliazer Wheelock, founder of Dartmouth. He obtained a A.B. from Yale in 1733; a D.D. from Dartmouth, 1774. Rev. Pomeroy was a minister in Hebron, Conn. from 1734 to 1784; a chaplain in the army during the French and Indian wars; and a chaplain in the 3rd regiment Connecticut Line, from Jan. 1777 to July 1778. His tombstone in Hebron bears the following inscription.

'Along the gentle slope of life's decline, He bent his gradual way; Till full of years, he drops Life's mellow fruit into the grave.'

He was born on 19 Nov 1704 at Suffield, Hartford, CT.65 He was buried on 21 Dec 1784 at Hebron, Tolland, CT.65 He died on 21 Dec 1784 at Hebron, Tolland, CT, at age 80.65

Abigail Pomeroy was a Teacher. After her husband, John Gillett, Jr., lost his fortune she established a school for young ladies in East Windsor, Conn. Mrs. Gilett is described as a gentlewoman of great beauty, dignity, anad stateliness of manner.

An obituary of the day, referring to her said: 'The hoary head is a crown of glory if it be found in the way of righteousness'. She was nearly 92 years of age at the time of her death.

Henry J. Clarke, in 'Captain Ralph Wheelock, His Ancestors and Some of His Descendants', 1903 writes.

'In 1718, the selectmen of Medfield petitioned the general court to grant them some county lands; this was the first movement on record toward the settlement of Sturbridge, or 'New Medfield,' as it was then called.'

Mr. Clarke writes that Ralph Wheelock fought in the Revolutionary War. This may be true, as several of Ralph's brothers fought in the War; but the only record in 'Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors of the Revolutionary War' is for Private Ralph Wheelock of Sturbridge. This was Ralph Wheelock's son, Ralph, Jr., of Pompey, NY, who later applied for and received a pension for having fought in 'the Massachusetts line' (see 'New York Pensioners', 1835). By the time the war started, Ralph, Sr. had already attained the rank of Captain, as indicated by the Sturbridge record of his marriage intention to Experience Crary; so it would not be likely that he would serve in the war with the rank of private.

Mr. Clarke writes further about Ralph.

'Captain Ralph Wheelock was treasurer of the town of Sturbridge for nearly twenty-five years from 1760, and was also selectman, assessor and constable; he was chosen a committee to purchase two and a half barrels of gun powder in 1774. He lived on the farm, formerly belonging to his father-in-law, James Dennison, and now owned by Willard Morse of Southbridge. In 1803 he sold 20

acres to his son Calvin, on the top of the hill; he sold 100 acres to his son James, which extended as far south as Abel Mason's land. In 1809, he conveyed a portion of his farm to his son Ephraim, now owned by George W. Wells, opposite the residence of Franklin Jacobs, in Southbridge. In 1804, he conveyed a portion of his farm to his son Moses, formerly owned by Vernon Chamberlain, in Southbridge; also, the same year, he conveyed a portion to his son Eleazer, formerly the James Morse farm. Dennison, had what is known as the Truman Chamberlain farm. Thus he gave his son shomes and saw them settled around him before he died.'

'He [Capt. Ralph Wheelock] with fifty others, sold a tract of land to the Baptist church for 10 pounds. He and his sons were petitioners for setting off the town of Southbridge from Sturbridge, which latter town then contained 20,032 acres, and extended from Oxford to Brimfield, and from the state line to Brookfield. Captain Ralph, and his three sons, Ensign Dennison, Eleazer, and Ephraim, were among the proprieters of the Congregational Church in Sturbridge, whose church building was 'raised' July 4th, 1797, and completed in 1800. In 1798, Capt. Ralph was the fifth largest real estate owner in Sturbridge, having 250 acres, valued at \$3124.00; Dennison had 130 acres valued at \$1565; Eleazer had 56 acres valued at \$867.00; and Ephraim 3 acres valued at \$49.00.'

There is a painting on display in the National Art Gallery in Washington, DC, entitled 'Ralph Wheelock's Farm', painted circa 1822 by Francis Alexander, who lived not far from Sturbridge, MA (in Connecticut). The painting was donated by Edgar William and Bernice Chrysler Garbisch.

When the painting was aquired by Colonel Garbisch, it bore the title 'Dennison Hall, Sturbridge, MA', and the author was unknown. Upon further research, it was discovered that there was no 'Dennison Hall' in Sturbridge, but there was a Dennison Hill in Southbridge, which was once part of Sturbridge. When photographed in the mid 1900's, the topography of Dennison Hill proved nearly identical to that represented in the painting. The painting was then renamed 'Dennison Hill, Southbridge'. Further research indicated that the white house in the middle of the painting was built by Captain Ralph Wheelock in 1765. The painting was then renamed 'Ralph Wheelock's Farm.'

The Jacob Edwards Library in Southbridge displays a painting of Globe Village, not far from Ralph Wheelock's farm, which is known to have been painted by Alexander, circa 1822. This painting bears an unmistakable resemblence in style, treatment of figures, and application of paint to that of 'Ralph Wheelock's Farm.'

William S. Tilden, in 'The History of Medfield', writes of Joseph as follows.

'Joseph kept school in 1763; married in 1770 Sarah Clark. He owned a port of the sawmill at Noon Hill as well as various lands in that vicinity, which he sold in 1769 to Joseph Plimpton; was a selectman in 1767 and 1770. He removed to Sherborn, where he lived several years; died in 1787, and his widow married Samuel Sanger of Sherborn in 1789.'

SARAH CLARK. According to 'The History of Medfield', by William S. Tilden, Sarah was the great granddaughter of Joseph Clark, one of the first thirteen settlers of Medfield, brother of Rebecca Clark, wife of Rev. Ralph Wheelock. The Leominster Vital Records do not use the 'Old Style' notation when giving his birth date - 'Feb. 14, 1729.'

Four years after the death of Joseph, his widow, 'Mrs. Allis Wheelock, of Lancaster' married Jesse Willis in Sudbury. This is presumed to be the same 'Mrs. Allis Wheelock', but is not proven.

Joseph (3) was born in Leominster, February 14, 1729, and died before 1778, when his uncle John bequeathed to his children. This uncle John deeded land to Joseph Wheelock in 1751, to Ethan Phillips in 1755, and to his brother Jonathan in 1741. Jonathan died in 1759, leaving sons Jonathan and Luke and daughters. Joseph married (????). Children: Oliver; John Jr., mentioned below; Joseph, Archibald, Abel, Elijah, Alice and Martha. A deed in Worcester county proves the relationship (Book 192, p. 103). John Wheelock, of Leverett, Hampshire County, deeded to Abel Wheelock, of Boston, his brother, his rights in the estate of his uncle, John Wheelock, whose will is mentioned above, and mentions his brother Oliver, also a legatee of John Wheelock; dated December 15, 1800. In 1790 this John Wheelock and his son, John Jr., were living in Heath, Massachusetts, near Leverett and Conway. John had in his family himself and wife; John Jr. had one son under sixteen and eight females. It is not known that John, Sr. had other children than John, Jr.

Walter T. Wheelock, in 'The Wheelock Family in America, 1637-1969', 1969, suggests that John Wheelock m. Sarah Willis. The record of this marriage is found in the Sudbury VRs. It is interesting to note that 'Mrs. Allis Wheelock of Lancaster' married Jesse Willis just a year later, also in Sudbury. This, presumably, is John's mother.

According to New England Families, Genealogical and Memorial', Cutter, Lewis Historical Publishing Company, 1914, Pg 1277, John Wheelock lived in Leverett, Hampshire Co, MA, and deeded lands to his brother, Abel Wheelock, of Boston, rights in the estate of his uncle, John Wheelock, and in the deed mentioned his brother Oliver, who was also a legatee of John Wheelock. The deed is dated 15 Dec 1800, and is found in Book 192, pg 103 of the Worcester County Registry of Deeds. [See Note 1].

The 1790 Census shows John Wheelock living in Leverett, MA, with 1 male over 16 (himself), 2 males under 16, and 3 females. The next census entry for Leverett is that of Samuel Willis, suggesting that they lived close together.

There are several men from Lancaster with the name John Wheelock who fought in the Revolutionary War. This may be one of them. Several of John's brothers also served: Archippus, Oliver, and probably Joseph.

Note 1: Given the relationships, this deed could also be that of John Wheelock, son of Joseph Wheelock (1707-1774) and Abigail \_\_\_\_\_, of Lancaster. However, this John lived in Heath, MA; appears in the 1790 Heath Census, and died in 1792.

The will of Daniel Wheelock, Jr., found in the Glocester, RI, town clerks office, was written 15 Mar 1781 and probated 15 Sep 1781. He leaves the house to 'Keziah, my dearly beloved wife'; land in Franconia, NH, to 'my four Sons Namely - Esek, Seth, Calven, and Leuther'; and half of his livestock to his daughter Hannah Wheelock. The will is witnessed by Keziah Hunt, who is the executor, and is later referred to as Keziah Wheelock.

The Rhode Island Vital Records list the death of Daniel, Jr., of Glocester, RI, on or around 28 July 1817, in his 37th year. This would place his birth somewhere around 1781. It is possible that this Daniel was an unborn child of Daniel and Keziah at the time of Daniel's death. (See 'Vital Records of Rhode Island, 1636-1850', by James N. Eli Wheelock was a Miller, Brewer. Eli Wheelock was a Fifer in the Revolutionary War. He fought in Colonel Ebenezer Learned's Regiment; and later under Colonel Cushing, and Colonel Jacob Davis.

According to Charles Hultgren, of the Charlton Historical Society, Eli Wheelock built part of what is now called the Ryder House, which is still standing on the Northside Turnpike in Charlton. Eli built this in a partnership with Leonard Morey. Eli operated a distillery at the site, making gin, whiskey, and beer. He expanded the house with the intention of turning it into a public house, but fell off the roof and killed himself during construction. He had no will. His portion was passed to the Ryder's, who opened the tavern.

Like his siblings, no record of birth for Edward is to be found in the Vital Records of Massachusetts. Edward grew up on his fathers farm in Charlton. The house he lived in, and one barn, are still standing on present day Cemetery Road.

He married his neighbor [1], Martha Daggett, on Independence Day, 4 July 1776. A few months later, his father died, leaving the bulk of his estate (including farmhouse and lands) to his eldest sons, Seth, Edward, and Paul. The three were also charged with the care of their mother, Abigail (Chapin) Wheelock.[9].

At the time, Edward was the only one of the three married, his wife pregnant. His older brother, Seth, was a soldier in the Revolutionary War, having by this time already marched on the 1775 Lexington Alarm, and served in several campaigns in 1776.

Perhaps because of the obligations of war, Seth sold his portion of the inheritance to Edward and Paul for 140 pounds [2]. The two remaining heirs then divided the land and buildings [3], living together with their mother and the younger children.

A few months later (Sep 1777), Edward's wife gave birth to their first child, Relief, and brother Paul went off to fight in the war. Though most of his brothers fought, no record of Edward's enrollment has been found; it may be that he relinquished service to care for the family and farm.

Edward remained on the inherited estate for 17 years. Deeds indicate that his brother Paul also remained, sharing the house with Edward.[4].

Edward appears in the 1790 Census, residing with 4 males under age 16, and 5 females. One of the females is his wife, Martha; one may be his mother, Abigail; the other three are probably daughters. Of the four sons, two are accounted for in the Charlton Vital Records, Silas and Reu. Marcus Waite in his 'papers' refers to additional male children Eli and Paul.

Of the four females, three are accounted for in the Charlton Vital Records, Hannah, Relief, and Cynda. The fourth may be his mother, Abigail, who was known to be living in the same house.

In Dec 1793, Edward sold his portion of the estate to his brother, John Wheelock of Spencer. [5] On the same date, his mother released him from his obligation to care for her.[6].

After this, no further record of Edward has been found. Given the appearance of some of his children in Batavia, Genessee County, NY, (in the 1805-1810 time frame), it is presumed that he and the entire family moved to New York, probably in 1794.[7, 8].

No death record or headstone for Edward or Martha has yet been found.

This is very likely Relief, daughter of Edward Wheelock and Martha Daggett. Note that Reuben who lived in Batavia, brother to Relief, had a son named Emmons Howe Wheelock.

'Wheelock Family', by C. Wheelock, and W. Gonseth reports that Edward Wheelock (John's brother) sold his Charlton land holdings to John Wheelock (of Spencer) in 1793.

John has a veteran's marker next to his headstone. He may be the same John Wheelock that served as a drummer in Capt. Luke Wilder's company, Col. Samuel Denney's Regiment, at Claverack, Oct-Dec 1779.

The following inscription appears on John's headstone.

Death like an overflowing stream.

Sweeps us away our lifes a dream.

An empty tale, a morning flower.

Cut down and withered[in our hour].

Lydia Davis. Lydia descends from her immigrant ancestor as follows: Lydia, Ebenezer, Edward, Samuel, John, William.

She was buried at Northside Cemetery, Charlton, MA.<sup>13</sup> She was born on 23 Dec 1767 at Charlton, Worcester, MA.<sup>144</sup> She died on 8 Jul 1821 at Charlton, Worcester, MA, at age 53.<sup>52</sup>

Adams was no doubt named for his grandmothers side of the family, closely related to President John Adams.

Adams father died when he was about 13 years of age, bequething to him 'eighty pounds lawful money', 'to be paid ... at the time when he shall arive at the age of twenty one years'.[1].

He served for 6 months in the Continental Army in 1780, at the age of 17. He is listed as being 5' 8' tall, and of light complexion.[2].

The vital records for Charlton indicate that Adams died of 'Palsy' at the age of 84.

Simeon Wheelock (1741-86) was a blacksmith in Uxbridge, MA. His shop is said to have been across the street from his house (which is still standing).

He served in the French and Indian War in 1760, and served under Col. Christopher Harris who commanded a regiment in Rhode Island.

He served in the Revolutionary War as a First Lieutenant of minute men at the Lexington Alarm in Capt. Joseph Chapin's company. He later served as Lieutenant in Captain Samuel Read's company, a regiment commanded by Lieutenant Colonel Nathan Tyler. Simeon was at the Providence, R.I. Alarm from 8 Dec 1776 to 21 Jan 1777.

He was a member of the first Safety Committee of Uxbridge. He was called to help suppress a small tax rebellion, led by Daniel Shay in Springfield. He w was very slippery. He fell, probably ruptured a blood vessel, and died the next day. He is buried in Springfield.

The house he built at Uxbridge is still standing (1998). It has been restored by the Uxbridge Historical Commission, serves as a historical landmark near the center of town.

The will of Silas Wheelock, father to Eleazar, leaves bequests to grandson Joseph Wheelock, and granddaughter Phebe Wheelock. (No other grandchildren of Silas by this name are recorded.).

However, the will does not mention Eleazar, indicating that Eleazar probably died before 1793, the date the will was allowed.

It is possible that Eleazar had children Phebe and Joseph by a wife before Betty Woodward, about whom there is no record, since Eleazar and Betty were married in 1771, and the children were born in the 1760's. The Charlton Vital Records report the birth of Joseph and Phebe to Eleazar and Elizabeth, who may be a different person than Betty Woodward.

It is also possible that the birth dates of Joseph and Phebe are incorrectly recorded. If these dates are correct, they would have been born while Eleazar was in his teens.

It is also possible that Joseph and Phebe were born to a different Eleazar Wheelock. But the reference to Joseph and Phebe in grandfather Silas' will is compelling. Carlyle Wheelock and Winifred Gonseth, in 'Wheelock Genealogy', 1955, indicate that Eleazar married Betty Woodward, citing the same evidence as presented here; but indicate birth dates for Joseph and Phebe in 1773 and 1775 respectively.
